We are among 83 colleges and universities newly designated this year, and a total of 361 to have earned the classification out of the more than 3,000 institutions of higher education nationwide. The elective status is achieved through voluntary participation in a rigorous, evidence-based external analysis of data and documents regarding aspects of our institutional mission, identity, practices, and reciprocal community commitments. realization of this goal results from numerous valued university-community partnerships and the heavy lifting of our data collection and writing team, Marit MacArthur, Associate Professor, Department of English; Tanya Boone, Department of Psychology Chair and Associate Professor; and Jim Drnek, Associate Vice President for Student Affairs. CSU Board of Trustees Approves University Office Center

At its meeting on January 28, 2015, the Board of Trustees approved a development agreement and plans for the construction on the CSUB campus of a commercial University office center. The University Office Center is a public-private

partnership between CSUB and Gregory D. Bynum and Associates. Phase I includes construction of a 61,300 gross square foot threestory, energy-efficient office building with courtyard, shade pavilion, drought-tolerant landscaping, drip irrigation, groundwater recharge, and 253 parking spaces on 4.3 acres. The \$10.4 million project cost is borne solely by the developer. No state or trustee funds are used. Phase II includes two buildings with 220,700 gross square feet, 591 ground-level parking spaces, and 315 spaces in a parking garage on 8.2 acres. The University will receive ground lease revenue of \$131,000 annually for the first 10 years for Phase I plus \$50,000 per year for up to five years for the option to develop Phase II, which will provide \$212,000 in annual lease revenue for the first 10 years when completed. Construction on phase I is scheduled to begin in August and completed in June 2016.



The project will extend Scarlet Oak Boulevard into the campus from Camino Media and will construct a portion of our internal Loop Road. The project also is intended to provide opportunities for tenants to collaborate with the

University on potential research, student internships, and employment for our graduates. I commend former Vice President for Business and Administrative Services Mike Neal, along with Assistant Vice President for Facilities Management Pat Jacobs, Elvyra San Juan, Assistant Vice Chancellor Capital Planning, Design, and Construction, and Greg Bynum for their perseverance through the years since conceptual approval. In addition, I want to thank Executive Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer Steve Relyea and Executive Vice Chancellor and General Counsel Fram Virjee and their staffs for their support and counsel in the finalization of the development agreement.

With each week's updated ranking, participating schools follow their performance against other colleges and use the results to rally their campus to reduce and recycle more.
