President - James Mitchell 2020-2022

CSUB recently celebrated its fiftieth year. Thirty-seven years ago, Charles Jones, Founding President, and Dr. Roy Dull, Dean of Extended Studies, met to explore ways of forming a campus-based organization of older adults. They visited several campuses where such organizations existed and decided to start an organization based on the 60+ Club at San Francisco State. Information was sent out, interested people gathered, the first board was chosen, and the charter was signed in April 1986.

Our membership continues to include retired professionals from many fields finding common interests that tap into CSUB activities. Times have changed. The campus and student body have grown. Computers now negate the need for many tasks that required an extra pair of hands. Student workers now do jobs 60+ Club members were asked to assist with. But the need for our help continues.

In September 2017, as food insecurity became a topic of concern, CSUB opened their food pantry. By September 2018, the 60+ Club members were donating to the food pantry on a monthly basis.

The Walter Stiern Memorial Rose Garden will always need hands-on care, for such is the nature of roses. The 60+ Plus Club has been taking care of the rose garden since 1992, and will continue to work with CSUB to maintain the garden as envisioned by Walter Stiern's sons, who donated the original roses to the university in the 1970's.

As many university functions change, the 60+ members will always have a passion to share their skills, a passion to help others, a passion for being involved.

Alumni Engagement: Director of Alumni Engagement - Sarah Hendrick 2015-2022

It is amazing how far we have all come in the last two years and how the club has continued to operate almost completely virtually due to a global pandemic. When the move to virtual happened in March 2020, it was uncertain how the club would carry on in a virtual environment. However, you pivoted well with board and general meetings held over Zoom, rose garden maintenance when allowed, and continuing to recruit new members. CSUB is grateful for your service to the



university, our athletics program, and the many senior citizens you serve in our community.

Late 2021 also saw the bittersweet departure of Administrative Assistant Erika Milam, who went on maternity leave. She assisted the 60 Plus Club with all things administrative and we have appreciated the club's flexibility as we've learned how best to service the club in her absence. Laila Agbalog, our student assistant, has done a nice job helping schedule meetings and working with me to help the club operate efficiently. Christine Bedell, senior alumni engagement specialist, also stepped in to help the club process checks and administer other items. Thank you, Christine! We are also grateful for the help of CSUB Accounting Director Jassica Gauna, who has pulled accounting reports to help treasurer Carla Stanley manage the 60 Plus Club budget.

This semester, we saw students come to campus for the first time in nearly two years as we slowly transition to a new normal. The university made great strides in keeping our campus and community safe by adhering to CDC and local public health guidelines. Currently, all faculty, staff and students are required to upload proof of vaccination or submit negative COVID testing if coming to campus. Events are starting to open a bit and we anticipate this will continue as we are less affected by the COVID-19 virus.

Vice President (Programs) - Carole Guillory 2019-2022

The Vice President (Programs) is in charge of securing speakers for the monthly general meetings which are held on the 2nd Thursdays of the month at 2:00pm.

At Possibilities Day for the 2019-2020 year, we gave out a list of topics for our members to choose their top interests for the upcoming year. We have systematically tried to find speakers for these chosen topics.

In April 2020, we were forced to cancel all speakers due to the pandemic. February 2021, we resumed our general speaker's meetings using virtual/zoom meetings. This presented a new interesting twist to our "in person" meetings. Some of our members were not interested in using an unfamiliar technology or in the lack of socializing with friends; others took to using Zoom to continue our meetings. The Zoom meetings, as with so many of life's issues, has its pros-and-cons. The pros: (1) We are able to"see" the sites that were being talked



about, and (2) utilizing speakers from out of town. The cons: (1) trying to get familiar with new technology, and (2) the unforeseen glitches that arise from that technology.

But, all in all, we have persevered and hopefully, in the near future, we will be returning to our monthly general meetings on campus.

Vice President (Membership) - Marilynn Perry (2018-2020)

According to the 2018-19 Membership Roster, we had 176 members. The pandemic and our inability to meet caused a drop in membership. Current numbers are approximately 80 members.

No membership dues were charged for 2020-2021 because we did not know if we would be able to meet on campus. 2021-2022, we renewed off-campus activities and awarded a scholarship. The decision was made to reduce the membership dues by half to \$20.00. Membership fees will return to \$40.00 per year when the club resumes meeting in person. As we look forward to holding in-person meetings, we will need someone to fill this position to make sure we meet every member and help them find their place in this organization.

Treasurer - Carla Stanley (2019-2022)

As of January 2022, Elder College has a balance of \$9612.98, the 60+ Club has a balance of \$12,596.67, for a grand total of \$22,209.65.

Because campus was closed from March 2020 to September 2021 and has had restricted access in 2022, the club has not had meetings on campus. Most of the monies used by the club pay the university for services such as parking passes, room rentals, catering, and equipment needed for meetings and we have not had these expenses since March 2020.

The 60+ Club started a scholarship for \$1500 in 2019. We awarded the scholarship for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school year. The Bulletin continued to be printed and mailed.

2021-2022 will see the 60+ Club awarding the scholarship (\$1500) and planting new roses in the Walter Stiern Memorial Rose Garden (approximately \$500) as well as the expenses of printing and mailing the bulletin.

COMMITTEES:

Historian - Gladys Stilwell (2013-2014), Phillip Scott (2016-2021), Carla Stanley (2022)

60+ Club lost Historian Phillip Scott in July 2021. Irene Randolph has continued to contribute pictures of the club's meetings and special gatherings. Social media has allowed instant sharing of photos after events, but it often hampers passing on photos and information in an organized manner. I have researched Biennial Reports from 1988 to 2012, to find background for this Summary Report, which is a bridge, acknowledging the past and creating a base for the future. Irene Randolph and Karen Polyniak are actively posting pictures of events to the CSUB60PLUS Facebook page.

Publicity - Camille Gavin (2013-2014), Phillip Scott (2016-2021)

The publicist wrote articles for the newspaper and submitted information for the weekly Calendar of Events. Public Service announcements were submitted to KVPR (Valley Public Radio). They also posted pictures and information on Facebook. There are many inquiring creative minds that could contribute to the 60+ Club if we were able to reach them and we need a person dedicated to this job to help us reach into the future.

Outreach - Judy Harris (2013-2017), Mitch Mitchell (2016-2017), Dolores Brooks (2017-2018)

For many years, the 60+ Club participated in Senior Day at the Fair, as well as the Department of Aging and the Retired Kern County Employees health fairs. By participating. we were letting the senior public know who we are and what we do. The best way to recruit new members is by personal contact and letting friends know how



much fun we have. It would be great to renew this Committee to encourage more people to discover new friends and activities in this club.

Special Events/Fellowship - Evelyn Glines (1999-2022)

This Committee has always organized Possibilities Day, the Christmas Luncheon, and the Installation Luncheon at the end of the year. Organization and publication have always been the key to successful gatherings enjoyed by all.

The Bulletin Editor - Karen Polyniak (2013-2022)

The 60+ Club has published *The Bulletin* under my editorship since 2011 since I took over from the late Jacqueline Hultquist who had been the editor for

(I believe) over 20 years. Jacqueline was in her mid 80's when she retired as editor, hopefully, someone else will be Editor before I am that age.

I have had President Messages from 6 presidents over the course of these 10+ years (Sharon Goldsmith, Bob Laramee, Ted Murphy, David Mathis, Cheryl Tikanen, James Mitchell). Normally, there are 8 *Bulletins* per 60+ year. Between 2011-2021, there have been 78 editions.

I was told to keep the publication down to 8 pages so that postage would just cost one 1st class stamp. We also sent it without an envelope. Now, we are sending with an envelope to ensure that the US Post Office sorting equipment doesn't damage our news.

Looking at past issues, there have been many changes in membership and in various activities, but overall, the members really make the Club. I still recall charter member Wendall calling me to give his contributions to Sing-A-Long. Initially, when I took over, he wanted me to read back his copy so that I would "get it right". President Ted Murphy wanted me to give him everyone's copy before he would write his President's Message. A particular new Interest Group Leader would always give me the current month info for next month's newsletter. It took a few times before he realized he needed to give me future information. Overall, everyone remembers that their copy is due on the prior 15th of the month as a rule, but that date is somewhat flexible.

Sunshine - Inge Kaplan, Janis Varner (2011-2014), Rosalie Brown (2015-2022)

2001 was the year the Sunshine Committee was formed. In early 2015, I was asked by Ted Murphy, who was Club President at the time I joined 60+, to take over the Sunshine Chair. Many cards are sent out for deaths of members, though a great many of Sunshine cards have been sent out for falls, medical procedures, ER visits, etc. Unfortunately, if I am not notified of an event or if I do not have a current address, I cannot send a card. Sometimes getting a card acknowledging what you and your family are going through makes us feel just a little better that day. Between 2015 and 2022, I have sent out almost 100 Sunshine cards.

The Coodinator for the Action Network traditionally keeps track of all the volunteer hours for Athletics, the Rose Garden, Fine Arts-Music & Jazz, Fine Arts-Theater, and the Well Repository.

Athletics - Enid Hall (2013-2018), Anne Kelly (2013 - 2016)

60+ Club members have been helping with Athletics

since 1988. We have been timers for swim meets, handled programs and souvenirs for Volleyball, Wrestling, and Basketball; we are there to do whatever they need an extra hand for.

FACT - Janet Skibinski (2013-2014)

In 1988, 60+ volunteers helped Biology professor Ted Murphy, faculty, and students at the Facility for Animal Care and Treatment open house the first Saturday of each month. As faculty and students instructed the public, we helped sell educational gifts and souvenirs. We also helped the FACT team with their

annual Memorial Day Barbeque which financed FACT activities. The Bulletin, November 2014, announced the last event for FACT opened to the public.

Fine Arts - Music & Jazz - Peggy Bryson (2012-2019), Donna Bartlett (2014-2019), Doug Davis (2018-2019)

Since 1988, we have provided assistance at the voice, instrumental music, and jazz performances, taking tickets and passing out programs, and have the option to watch the programs once the doors close.



Fine Arts-Theater - Billie Swanson (2013-2022)

As Chairman of the 60+ Fine Arts - Theatre Committee at CSUB, my duty is to provide volunteers for each performance. I usually get a call or email from Mandy Rees (chair of the Theater Department) or she sends a program for each semester with dates and times for shows. The number of days the shows run vary, and we try to provide two to four volunteers to take tickets and pass out programs for each performance. I call volunteers from the list of people who have volunteered on Possibilities Day. They can volunteer for any day or Sunday matinee only (no nights). I try to follow their requests. I do a lot of calling to find 8-12 volunteers for each show. Once called, they are to arrive 15 minutes before the doors open to check in with the theater staff. Volunteers work about 30 minutes taking tickets and passing out programs. When the doors close and the performance starts, we can go in and watch. I also put the play dates in *The Bulletin* to get more volunteers. This is usually a popular activity.

Walter Stiern Memorial Rose Garden - Jean Childers (2006-2018), Carla Stanley (2019-2022)



In 1992, Fred and Mary Krauter, with 14 volunteer gardeners, took charge of the Walter Stiern Memorial Rose Garden. Seventy roses were donated that year by Jackson & Perkins in Wasco for a total of 250 roses to be tended.

In 1995, the University installed a new irrigation system and Sam Trivitt, a local rosarian, designed new plots and pathways for the All American Rose Selection (AARS) roses displayed in the garden.

In 1996, the bench and shade structure was completed with plaques honoring CSUB for 25 years of excellence, and the 60+ Club founding committee. Sixteen



new roses were added this year.

By 1998, 400 rose bushes were blooming, with Jackson & Perkins and Weeks, both in Wasco, continuing to donate new plants. The Krauters retired as team leaders in 2003. Because of some irrigation and gopher problems, there had been some die-off and there was an estimated 300 roses in the garden.

In 2005, a sundial was placed in the garden with a plaque honoring Fred and Mary Krauter for their years of service.

In 2019, the 60+ Club board voted to give \$500 to plant new roses in the Walter Stiern Memorial Rose Garden. New roses were planted in 2020, with some losses as we figured out sprinklers and watering in the various beds. An additional \$500 was allocated in 2021, but roses could not be planted due to COVID restrictions. Repairs were done on the sprinklers in 2019, and adjustments were made in 2022. The university provided mulch in Spring of 2022, and we applied it to the beds. With this year's planting of 24 new roses, we now have 185 bushes in the garden.



There is room for more and I am hoping to do more planting every year, removing some older bushes that are no longer doing well. Some bushes are sending out shoots, and this year I am potting these volunteer roses and will put them back into the garden in the next year or two. I am experimenting with growing roses from cuttings, hoping to duplicate some of the older roses that are no longer for sale. In an effort to preserve water, the university will mulch the garden this year.

Many club members have helped over the last few years, but Anne Holden, Linda Cohen, Gary Knerr, and Trish and

Mike Mills have been the most steadfast members of the Rose team. We are averaging about 80-90 volunteer hours spent in the garden every year.

Short Term Projects - Judy Harris (2013-2016)

This committee has been part of the Action Network since the beginning of the club in 1986, responding to calls for temporary help on campus. In the past, its volunteers have provided clerical assistance (for example, staffing the phone prior to the opera, or helping with mailing the bulletin) and academic related endeavors (e.g., sorting maps for the Geology Department). By 2000, we were wrapping utensils for barbeques on campus, tying diplomas, handing out programs at commencement ceremonies, and helping with special mailings. The university has changed



tremendously since 1986 and uses students for many of the tasks we were asked to do. Reviving this committee could help us find new ways to help on campus, and being seen helps recruit new members.



California Well Sample Repository -Willam Todd (2013-2019)

The Repository contains a historical collection of geological core samples from more than 4,000 gas and oil wells drilled all over California from as far back as 1930. Our volunteers have been helping since the organization of the club in 1988. We are responsible for carefully organizing and indexing the samples, well reports, and

well logs. The CWSR Curator Charles James runs the repository and helps the



volunteers.

From 2012-2020, 60+ Club members volunteered a total of 3,339 hours at the California Well Sample Repository. Some years there were 10-12 volunteers. In more recent years, as people retired, there have been only 5-6 volunteers.

The work remains the same, that of repackaging oil well core samples from their original paper bags, to heavy duty

plastic bags that are more durable. Information on the well name and depth of the sample is transferred to the new bags. Geology students log the information into the computer, put the samples in the new boxes, and return them to shelves in the warehouse. These samples are from all over California, but primarily from the San Joaquin Valley and Los Angeles areas. Many are from the years 1930-1950.

Over the years, the Repository building has been upgraded with new tables and chairs. Most importantly, it now has a cooler for those 90+ degree days, and heaters over work tables for those winter days when it is colder inside than it is



outside.

INTEREST GROUPS - Lew Jones, Cheryl Martin (2013-2015), Sandy Dralle (2015-2017), Pat Lindsey (2017-2018), **Charlene Edwards (2018-2021)**

Interest groups are developed and run by the members for the members. As interests and membership change, so do our Interest Groups.

Art for Fun (2014-2017), Creative Writing (2013-2015), Out and About (2013-2016), Classics Revisited (2012-2019), Mystery Book Club (2018-2020) and Readers Group 1 (2013-2019) were discontinued. Wendall Kinney was the long-time leader of the Music Sing-A-Long, which was suspended at his death.

Since the pandemic was declared March 2020, we could no longer meet on campus for Around the Cracker Barrel or Coffee with the Professor. They will hopefully return when we are able to return to campus.

In the meantime, we have Fun & Games, a big hit, which meets monthly in the game room of a local pizza restaurant. The Readers Group (formerly Readers Group 2) has been able to continue as a Zoom monthly meeting, with in-person

meetings starting in April 2022. Knit One Crochet Too, the Lunch Bunch, and the Dinner Club have all revived as pandemic restrictions have eased.

We encourage the members to share what fascinates and stimulates them by starting new interest groups.

Around the Cracker Barrel - Milt Clift (2013-2014), Gary Ivey (2014-2015), Lewis Jones (2018-2019)

This interest group started in 2005. The statement of purpose is as follows: The Cracker Barrel will invite open dialogue concerning a variety of local, national, and international issues. In so doing, we hope to activate the symbiotic relationship between discourse and reasoning, both being fundamental to the reinforcement or modification of previously held views.

Coffee with the Professor - Barbara Fleming, Sue Glenn (2013-2014), Ted Murphy (2014-2015), Sandy Dralle (2015-2017), Ted Murphy & Kaye LeFebvre (2018-2019)

This interest group has been active since 1996, meeting once a month during the academic year (except December) for a lecture of about 45 minutes by a CSUB professor, followed by a question-and-answer period.

This activity was also disrupted by the pandemic, and we hope to revive once our activities move back on campus.

Dinner Club - Judy Harris (2013-2017), Karen Carey (2013-2018), Charlene Edwards (2017-2018), Linda Cohen & Marilyn Stewart (2018-2022)



The Dinner Club meets monthly (currently the third Tuesday of the month) at 5:30 pm. Each month a different restaurant is chosen and we try to visit mostly locally owned/operated restaurants. We have anywhere from six to 20+ attendees each month. All members are welcome to join our group, either on a regular basis or occasionally.

We have dined at Italian, Asian, Indian, American, and continental restaurants and welcome suggestions from any of the group as to where to go each month. We have had a lot of fun at dinners and it's a great way to get to know more 60+ members and to patronize local restaurants.

From March of 2020 through August 2021 we did not meet due to COVID-19, but are hopeful that we can now continue to meet on a regular basis.

I joined Marilyn Stewart as co-chair in November 2018 and we have really enjoyed this group.

Fun & Games - Bob and Carole Guillory (2019-2022)

Fun and Games group meets the 1st Wednesday of the month at Round Table Pizza on Gosford Road. Round Table graciously allows us to use the private party room in the back at no charge. We enjoy a no-host lunch; then around 1:00 we start playing games.



We always have a game of Mexican Train going and have recently added Mahjong. We have also enjoyed a few different card games. Everyone is invited to bring a game of their choice to play as the group is always up for learning something new.

As with all of CSUB activities. we had to suspend our game days for several months in 2020 due to Covid.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Elder College - Cheryl Tikanen (2013-2020)

In 1990, the 60+ Club formed an Elderhostel Committee coordinated by Harvey and Laura Brockmeyer. Thirty-two people came and lived in the dorms for a week in August, going on field trips, taking classes, and being wined-and-dined. In 1992, the committee made the decision to use a hotel for more flexible timing and greater comfort for the participants.

In 1995, the name was changed to Elder College. With this change, the instruction and field trips stayed the same, but the participants stayed at home and came to campus. The price per enrollee dropped from \$345 to \$95 which included five days of instruction, five lunches, one all-day field trip, and one final dinner.

In 2000, another change was made. Elder College became a three-day course of one-and-a-half hour daily sessions, lunch in the dining commons, and an all day field trip and a special last night dinner. Scholarship (2019-2022)

January 2019, Cheryl Tikanen suggested we consider providing a student scholarship. The Scholarship committee was set up in April consisting of Cheryl, Kim Jones, Kay LaFebvre, Sharon Mills, and Carla Stanley (Three board members and two members at large). With input and direction from Heath Niemeyer, Director of Development, a scholarship agreement was drafted with information required by the university. Specifically:

Scholarship will be renewed annually by a board vote Scholarship will be \$1500

Only upper division students from the school of Nursing or Education will be eligible

Grade point requirement is 3.0 and above

A 300-500 word essay on "Contributions to our community" must be completed.

By October of 2019, Cheryl reported the scholarship was in place and funds would be available for the next Fall and the committee met in August 2020. Scholarship awarded to Clairice Poblete, Nursing, for the 2020-2021 school year.

Food Pantry (2018-2020)

In 2017, CSUB opened a Food Pantry on campus to help address food insufficiency amount the student body. Janis Varner took charge and got the 60+ Club involved.

Using our most efficient means of communication, she announced a needed food item (for example, peanut butter and jelly or breakfast cereals) in *The Bulletin*. Members would bring the items to the meeting and we would cart the items over to the nearby Food Pantry for them to put the items on their shelves. When campus closed because of the pandemic, our assistance stopped, thought we were able



to gather items for the Food Pantry at the 2021 Christmas Gathering.
