## Additional Information and Policies:

If you are seeking subject matter certification through the CSUB Social Science Subject Matter Waiver Program, you may be admitted to the Credential Program if you have successfully completed $80 \%$ of the subject matter program course work and have met the minimum 2.7 Social Science gpa requirement. You must successfully complete $100 \%$ of the Social Science Program requirements prior to beginning Stage II of the Credential Program.

Courses taken at an institution other than CSUB: To earn a Subject Matter Waiver from the CSUB Social Science Program, at least 70\% of your upper-division Social Science course work must be completed at CSUB. Students may be required to present syllabi for evaluation of upper-division requirements not taken at CSUB. Exceptions to this policy will be made only after consideration and approval by the Social Science Academic Petitions Committee. Candidates must present requests for exceptions to the committee prior to the semester they are seeking certification. Additionally, please note that only those courses in which a candidate has earned a C- or better will be accepted.

Currency of courses: All required Social Science courses have a content currency tenyear expiration date. In order for courses to count for your waiver, they must have been taken within ten years of completing the waiver program for content currency. For example, if you expect to be issued a certification in May 2020, your Social Science coursework must have been completed after May 2010 to be eligible and counted for the waiver.

Evaluation Fee: There is a $\$ 75.00$ transcript evaluation fee for non-native students. If you earned a baccalaureate degree from CSUB, you are considered a native student.

CSET Exams: Those who have a degree may choose to complete the Social Science program or demonstrate competency in their subject area by taking the CSET
examination in Social Science. The examinations, which cover United States and world history, government, economics, geography, and behavioral sciences, include multiplechoice and constructed response components.
