Additional Information and Policies:

If you are seeking subject matter certification through the CSUB Social Science Subject Matter Waiver Program, you may be admitted to the Credential Program if you have successfully completed 80% of the subject matter program coursework and have met the minimum 2.7 Social Science gpa requirement. You must successfully complete 100% of the Social Science Program requirements prior to beginning Stage II of the Credential Program.

To earn a Subject Matter Waiver from the CSUB Social Science Program, at least 70% of your upper-division Social Science course work must be completed at CSUB.

All required Social Science courses have a ten-year expiration date. In order for courses to count for your waiver, they must have been taken within ten years of completing your waiver program. For example, if you expect to be issued a certification in May 2019, your Social Science coursework must have been completed after May 2009 to be counted. Additionally, please note that only those courses in which a C- or above is earned will be accepted.

There is a \$75.00 transcript evaluation fee for non-native students. If you earned a baccalaureate degree from CSUB, you are considered a native student.
