C. Upper Division Electives (4 approved courses)

In addition to the foundation and core requirements, students must complete four approved 3000 - level courses in Public Policy and Administration.













PPA - MPA 4 + 1 Program: Graduate in 5 years with both your undergraduate degree (BA) and Masters (MPA) degree in public administration with our NASPAA accredited fast-track program!



Altogether, students on the accelerated path must complete at least 150 units in order to earn their BA and MPA degrees. Students must consult their faculty advisor for more information.

Classes:

- A. Take normal BA coursework for the first 3 years (90 units).
- B. Second semester of third year, students may apply for the accelerated path if they:
 - 1. Have a minimum GPA of 3.0
 - 2. Get approval from their faculty advisor
- C. Fourth year, students on this path will take:

PPA 4010, PPA 4038, PPA 5000, PPA 5020, and 6 other BA PA (or other) courses approved by their faculty advisor.

• At the end of this year, students with a GPA of 3.0 or higher may continue to the MPA program or revert back to the BA degree program. Students with a GPA below 3.0 will end their participation in the accelerated path and will revert to the BA program.

D. Fifth year, students on this path will take:

PPA 6100, PPA 6110, PPA 6520, PPA 6530, 5 electives, and a culminating project

Questions you may have

What is being compared?

The table compares people with this degree against people in all fields who have a bachelor's degree.

What is a median wage?

The median is a midpoint: Half of people in this degree field earned more than this amount each year, and half earned less.

What is a bachelor's degree?

A bachelor's degree usually requires at least 4 years of full-time academic study beyond high school.

What is an advanced degree?

Advanced degrees include master's, doctoral, or professional degrees and may be in a field other than that of the bachelor's degree. They usually require at least 1 to 3 years of full-time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

What to do with this degree?

- Nonprofits account for 12.3 million jobs, 10.2 percent of private sector employment, in 2016 (Bureau of Labor Statistics).
- Public administrators promote urban development, implement public policies, and protect public safety. With a public administration degree, graduates can work in the public, private, and nonprofit sectors. Public administration programs train students for careers in public service (TBS Staff).
